Spring Outing Retrospective

Spring Outing happened just after the summer issue of the North Wind went to press. All the dust has settled now, and it's a good time to look back and reflect on what seems to have been a big success.

We had 143 registered for the Outing – 103 adult participants, 38 leaders and non-participating companions, and 2 children/youth. 98 came to the barbecue in Lehman Park on Friday night, and the same number to the banquet at Thatcher Hall on Saturday. 77 Outing participants came to the Saturday evening concert, and we had 71 spectators who bought tickets in the community or at the door. After all expenses we were left with a surplus of \$736 for the Outing.

Friday and Saturday featured ideal weather – sunny and pleasantly warm without being hot. On Sunday we received some heavy rain showers. People seemed to enjoy themselves, even in the rain. Of 34 planned trips, three were cancelled long ahead of time and one on the day. Everything else went ahead, with good turnouts.

Jamie Savage performed at Happy Hour. Jeff Miller planned a planetarium show, which had to be cancelled because of construction on campus. Jeff substituted observing the moon through a telescope and binoculars at Lehman Park. Most agreed the barbecue and the banquet were very well done by PACES, the SUNY Potsdam caterers. Most reports of the residence accommodations were favorable. The concert by Dan Duggan, Peggy Lynn, and Dan Berggren at Snell Music Theatre was popular. We were especially pleased by the response from music fans in the region who came to the concert, some from great distances, even though they didn't take part in the rest of Spring Outing.

We collected a lot of evaluation forms on the last day, and most people seemed to have had a very good experience. A few people added comments, and one, Kathy Clerkin of the Niagara Frontier Chapter, went to the effort of sending detailed comments and glowing praise to extend to all who helped organize and lead.

There are a lot of people to acknowledge. They include Nancy Hess and Donna Ober of SUNY Potsdam; Jeff Miller; Jamie Savage; Mary MacKinnon, Peggy Mooers, Linda Moerschell, Pat Mueller, Charles and Lila Hunnewell, Jo Den Bleyker, and Elizabeth Taylor (all of whom took part in managing concert ticket sales); all our trip leaders; Geri Ames, whose line drawings featured on the brochure; Ellie Menz and Mary Jane Watson (finances); Betsy Tisdale (entertainment); David Katz (web site); Tom Ortmeyer (publicity); Bill Mueller (outings planning); and Marianne Hebert (registration and liaison with SUNY Potsdam). Their efforts led to a very successful Outing.

I had occasion to attend an ADK board of directors meeting in July and listened to a presentation about liability forms and accident reports. Accidents on trips are very rare, but when they happen they have to be reported immediately, directly to ADK Headquarters. There is an accident report form on the chapter web site. We have a very good record in the chapter of completing and handing in the trip sign-up and liability waiver forms. We hope this will continue, as it is an important part of the ADK's risk management.

The newsletters of a couple of other chapters noted recently that as time goes by some of us find tough High Peaks hikes to be no longer attainable. However there is a wealth of possible hikes to "Low Peaks" or to "No Peaks". We are fortunate to have plenty of destinations of all kinds in our area and trips of all levels of difficulty usually get a good turnout. One of the articles also encourages members to organize events that have no physical component at all – cultural events of various kinds for example. It's a thought-provoking idea, and might be worth trying. Our own outings coordinator Bill Mueller recently advised us that events need not be limited to the weekends; weekdays offer another chance to extend the program.

We're going to run an Educational Affiliate Program (EAP) again this year at SUNY Potsdam. Students will be welcome on our regular outings, and we're also going to set up a few just for them. The main Club will put on a couple of weekend events in the High Peaks for students, and there may be technique clinics depending on demand. If you're interested in helping with this program, contact me.

We were sad to learn of the passing of Dick Kepes. Dick has long been a friend of the chapter and the ADK. Many in recent years will remember the parties at the Kepes residence following trail improvement events at Lampson Falls. A conservation easement on their property will be a long-lived memorial to Dick, appreciated by all who love wilderness. Our sympathy, thoughts, and prayers go out to Joan and to all of Dick's family.

Conservation 9-2013

Work on the Red Sandstone Trail this May resulted in improved stairways around the gulch on the shores of peaceful Sugar Island Flow, thanks to the efforts of Armond Spencer, Ron Johnson, and Jim Murray. [See photo on p.4]

A much bigger trail project is the bicycle trail at O'Malley Brook, on county land opposite the Colton transfer station and near the Stone Valley Trail. Chapter members Ben Yandeau and Phil Bridgeman have been convening ADK and county mountain bike club members weekly to clear a new trail of over two miles. This will also be good for walking and skiing. We hope to hold a grand opening in October. [David T: photo included if you have room].

The Stone Valley partners (property owners and land stewards, including ADK) have met throughout the summer to develop a written agreement about what the Stone Valley Cooperative Recreation Area should be, how it should be cared for, how users and caretakers are to behave, what efforts are needed to preserve

The Raquette River Advisory Council, RRAC, which advises Brookfield Renewable Energy about recreational and environmental issues on the lands and water of the Raquette from Piercefield to the St. Lawrence (and on which I sit as your rep), will be taking up invasive species as a problem this fall. We hope to fund an inventory of invasive plants along the river and identify some removal campaigns that have a chance of success.

Education

Observations from one of the chapter's volunteer trail crew participants:

Hello, my name is Gaetan Foisy and I am 15. I have been volunteering for the ADK for the past two years, and I plan on many more. This year my group went to Hurricane Mt. and made a half-mile of new trail. The new trail was needed because part the old one was flooded by beavers. It took my group of seven, three and a half days to clear and bench the new trail to our leaders' satisfaction. We camped in a lean-to at the base of the mountain, next to a frigid stream. The food that we brought in and cooked was delicious and healthy. I am thankful that both our leaders were great chefs. I would recommend the volunteer trail crew to anyone who likes nature and isn't afraid to get their hands dirty.

October 12 (Saturday) Furnace Mt. To avoid the crowds on Columbus Day weekend, we'll climb a little mountain few know of, off the Red Tavern Road. About 6 miles RT and 900 feet elevation gain, level 3. Contact Armond Spencer 315-379-1383.



June 9 (Sunday) Cycling from Cape Vincent to Alexandria Bay - John Barron (TL), Toni Towle, Peter Blood.
